8th March – International Women's Day

Celebrated on the 8th of March, International Women's Day (IWD) gives focus to issues such as gender equality, reproductive rights, and violence and abuse against women. IWD has been observed since as early as 1909, when the Socialist Party of America organised an event called Women's Day in New York on the 28th of February that year. This celebration inspired German delegates at the 1910 International Socialist Women's Conference to propose a 'special Women's Day' to be organised annually. After the Russian Revolution in 1917, IWD was made a national holiday on the 8th of March, IWD was associated with far-left movements and governments until its adoption by the global feminist movement in the late 1960s. It became a mainstream global holiday following promotion by the United

Each year, there is a theme to IWD. This year's theme is 'Inspire Inclusion.' The IWD website says of the theme: "When we inspire others to understand and value



women's inclusion, we forge a better world. And when women themselves are inspired to be included, there's a sense of belonging, relevance, and empowerment. Collectively, let's forge a more inclusive world for women. To truly include women means to openly embrace their diversity of race, age, ability, faith, body image, and how they identify. Worldwide, women must be included in all fields of endeavour."

Everyday Sexism by Laura Bates

In 2012 after being sexually harassed on London public transport Laura Bates, a young journalist, started a project called Everyday Sexism to collect stories for a piece she was writing on the issue. Astounded by the response she received and the wide range of stories that came pouring in from all over the world, she quickly realised that the situation was far worse than she'd initially thought. Enough was enough. From being leered at and wolf-whistled on the street, to aggravation in the work place and serious sexual assault, it was clear that sexism had been normalised. Bates decided it was time for change. This bold, jaunty and ultimately intelligent book is the first to give a collective online voice to the protest against sexism. This game changing book is a juggernaut of stories, often shocking, sometimes amusing and always poignant - it is a must read for every inquisitive, no-nonsense modern woman.






Loki: Where Mischief Lies by Mackenzi Lee

This is the first of three young adult novels from New York Times best-selling author Mackenzi Lee that explores the untapped potential and duality of heroism of popular characters in the Marvel Universe. Before the days of going toe-to-toe with the Avengers, a younger Loki is $desperate\ to\ prove\ himself\ heroic\ and\ capable,\ while\ it\ seems\ everyone\ around\ him\ suspects\ him\ of\ inevitable\ villainy\ and\ depravity\ \dots\ except$ for Amora. Asgard's resident sorceress-in-training feels like a kindred spirit-someone who values magic and knowledge, who might even see the best in him. But when Loki and Amora cause the destruction of one of Asgard's most prized possessions, Amora is banished to Earth, where her powers will slowly and excruciatingly fade to nothing. Without the only person who ever looked at his magic as a gift instead of a threat, Loki slips further into anguish and the shadow of his universally adored brother, Thor. When Asgardian magic is detected in relation to a string of mysterious murders on Earth, Odin sends Loki to investigate. As he descends upon nineteenth-century London, Loki embarks on a journey that leads him to more than just a murder suspect, putting him on a path to discover the source of his power-and who he's meant to be.
