Headteacher's Update

As you know, today is our entrance test day for prospective students. With just 13 days of the academic year under our belt, we're already well into the cycle for 2024/25!

I was a pleasure to see so many Year 10 families on Wednesday evening at our Curriculum Evening. One of our school priorities this year is to further develop our parental engagement strategy, and it was really heartening to be part of the Q&A session that followed the presentations.

Evidence from the Education Endowment Foundation highlights that parental engagement has a positive impact equivalent to around 4 months' additional progress. It was clear from the feedback we received that you as parents are 100% committed to your children's education, and many parents on Wednesday were seeking further clarity on how you can further support your children in their learning.

As you know, we have moved from Satchel One (Show My Homework) as our homework setting platform to Microsoft Teams this year. We have made this move in common with a number of other schools as we feel it is a better platform to use. Unfortunately, the parent interface was not released in time for September, and I appreciate that parents cannot see homework set at this time. Microsoft have told us this is due for release in November. We could have waited and made the switch mid-year, but we felt it was better to start September on the new platform and so I do thank you for your patience while this comes on stream.

Please be assured that homework is being set, and that you can all ask your children to show you their homework on MS Teams in the meantime. We know that homework and independent study is an important part of the learning process, but we do insist that teachers do not set homework due for the next day – we appreciate that students do a lot outside of school, and we want to allow them scope to manage their time to do this. We also maintain homework-free weeks in the week before a holiday.

There is a wealth of information about our curriculum on our website here, including topic outlines for each subject, and exam information for KS4 and 5. We confirmed our Assessment Calendar for the year at the start of term, and our assessment window for each year group will be added to the school calendar imminently. Prior to each assessment window, you will receive a detailed timetable via Arbor. Our new website is under development and I hope this will meet with your approval when we launch later this term.

You can view your child's timetable via the Arbor App and you can look up their teachers here too. Should you have any questions you can contact the subject teacher, alternatively, please view the staff list here to find the relevant Subject Leader/Head of Department and you are welcome to make contact with them directly.

One area of discussion at our Curriculum Evening was around the use of ChatGPT and AI and the implications for schools. ChatGPT was released in November 2022, and so is less than a year old. It had more than one million users within the first five days of release, making it the fastest growing app ever. It will impact how teachers teach and will change how students learn. Next week I meet with all the Headteachers within our Trust for our first conference of the year. The impact of AI is on the agenda and we are going to be discussing this new technology and how we might respond to it as a sector. As teachers, we know that new and evolving technologies will continue to feature. We successfully welcomed the internet and said goodbye to CD-ROM and Encarta! We will navigate the impact of Chat GPT in the classroom and we will balance the positive and negative sides of this technology. It may contribute to the development of personalised learning, and may increase accessibility for some. It will probably play an integral part in language learning and I am sure that in the future it will contribute to us creating even more engaging and effective learning environments. However, we must balance potential positives as we seek to balance the amount of screen time for young people, and a potential overreliance on technology. If we simply accept what this technology tells us there is a potential for misinformation, and an impact on data privacy.

What is certain is that we are running to keep pace with the technology and are aware of the impact of its presence. I am still heartened every day when I see young people playing outside, especially on the field at the moment, having lunch on the picnic benches and reading books around school. This will not change, and the human and physical world is definitely here to stay at Newstead!

NASA Lunar Samples

We were very privileged to receive a loan of NASA lunar samples this week. These samples were brought back from the moon by those famous astronauts (Armstrong, Aldrin & Collins) of the Apollo 11 lunar landing. There were also other rare samples for students to explore and find out about, such as pieces of rock from Mars, rare meteorites and some meteorites that have been aged at over 3 billion years old. All students had the exciting opportunity to see the samples of lunar rock and Martian meteorites over a lunchtime. This unique opportunity was enjoyed by staff and students and was lots of fun. The students and staff were quite simply 'over-the-moon' about the opportunity. Mr Sheehan aims to secure the loan again from NASA again in the near future and plans to extend the opportunity to parents of students too.









Caius Explore Day

In the summer, I was selected from among 350 applicants to the Caius Explore essay competition as a winner in the history strand. I was invited to come to Cambridge for a celebration lunch and meet the directors of studies.

I decided to enter Caius Explore after seeing the competition on LinkedIn profiles from people who had greatly benefited from their experiences. My task was to concentrate on a certain object and research its history for the history thread. I had intended to write about Nazi Germany for my essay, but I was unable to figure out how to do so. But after seeing the recent sale of Hitler's pen on the BBC's Instagram reel, I immediately started researching its background. By reading various articles surrounding the sale and differing views on it, I came to my own conclusions.

While the sale of such an object encouraged anti-Semitism and idolised a person who was responsible for the deaths of millions of people, it raises concerns about the attitudes of Jews who lived during Hitler's time and may have had access to more significant artefacts to illustrate a historical journey. I was able to put into perspective the Jewish objects that have such profound importance, yet no one would pay £34,000 for a Jewish item, by sharing my attendance at the Holocaust Ambassador Conference 2023. While Nazi memorabilia downplays the scale of the harm it wrought in its advertising and construction. Nazi zealots are a frightening group of individuals who fantasize about establishing a Nazi Germany state in contemporary democratic society, fostering the growth of perilous radical ideas. For instance, Pergozhin and his Wagner group support numerous Third Reich ideals through tattoos in contemporary Russian politics. As a result, I published an essay titled 'Nazi memorabilia: Historical artefacts or murderous instruments', while researching historical accounts of the time the pen was made as well as current news pieces.

Writing this essay was a lot of fun for me because I was able to connect many his torical sources—such as survivor testimonials and historical information on legislation passed—to create a broad summary. In the end, the history department's director of studies noticed this work and chose me as the winner of the history strand. The lunch in the Hogwarts-like hall was the day's high point, among many incredible moments, such as meeting like-minded students. Understanding the opportunities at Cambridge and the application process was also made possible for me by meeting the admissions tutor. This celebratory day served as a reminder of my success as well as a motivation for me to continue exploring my historical interests and think about applying to Cambridge.

GCSE History Trip to Berlin

We left Gatwick Airport at around 7am, and when we arrived in Berlin Airport, we got the train to our hostel, where we dropped off our luggage. We then had a short walk into the city centre of East Berlin, where we all went off to have a brief lunch before the walking tour.

The 2-hour walking tour of Berlin was highly informative. We visited lots of different types of buildings and statues, all of which we were told some relevant history about. Places that we visited included the TV tower on Alexander Platz (one of Berlin's most prominent landmarks), a memorial for Jewish people who had died in the war, and the Brandenburg gate.



After this, we had some free time where we all went out to get a drink and do some souvenir shopping, and then we headed out for dinner, which we had at an American diner set in the 1950s. Eventually, we returned to the hostel to settle in, and that was Day 1 complete.

The next day, we woke up early to have breakfast at the hostel and got the coach to the Sachsenhausen Memorial where we had a self-guided tour while looking around the memorial, and we all learned so much.

We then returned to Potsdam for lunch, and then went to the Topography of Terror Museum, which was all about the Nazi party in the 1930s and 1940s. The next museum we went to was the Checkpoint Charlie Museum, which



told us lots about what life was like on either side of the Berlin Wall, and even stories of people trying to escape from East to West.

After dinner in the evening, we went to look at remnants of the Berlin Wall at the East Side gallery, before heading back to the hostel.

On the final day, it was another early start, and we walked to the DDR museum. This was an interactive museum which showed us what it was like to live in East Berlin after World War Two. We were shown around and told personal stories and experiences by a man who grew up as a child in East Berlin, which was really engaging. Then we looked around the rest of the museum ourselves.

After lunch, we then headed back to the airport to catch our flight back to England. It was a really interesting trip, with lots of important information, and the teachers were all so lovely and informative the whole time! Thank you!
