

# **External Competition:** Martha Mills Writing Prize Open for Entries

The Martha Mills Prize for writing was set up in memory of Martha, the daughter of Merope Mills (editor of the Guardian's Saturday Magazine) and Paul Laity (an editor at the London Review of Books), who tragically passed away in 2021, aged 13. Martha was a keen reader and writer, and the prize seeks to give young people a chance to explore new themes in their writing in her honour.

The competition, now in its second year, invites 11-14-year-olds living in the UK to submit up to 500 words of any kind of prose e.g., a fictional story, a piece of schoolwork, a diary entry, based on a theme. This year's theme is 'a secret'. Three winners will receive £200 each, as well as a selection of books, a 'special souvenir', and an expensespaid trip to a ceremony at the London Review Bookshop. A selection of entries, including the three winners', will be published in a pamphlet. The closing date for entries is the 19<sup>th</sup> of July

The judging panel says of entries: "we are looking for writing that is lively, unusual or otherwise original... it doesn't have to be perfect or finished - we want to see the work that you're most proud of or most excited about. Don't worry if you haven't written much before or don't know if you're a 'writer'." This year, the judging panel includes bestselling author Philip Pullman, one of Martha's favourite writers.

International Nurses Day is observed on the 12<sup>th</sup> of May each year to coincide with the birth of Crimean War nurse, Florence Nightingale. Since 1988, the day has been assigned a theme by the International Council of Nurses (ICN). This year's theme is 'the economic power of care.' Dr Pamela Cipriano, president of the ICN, explained that the theme was chosen to 'highlight the need for nursing to be seen as an investment, instead of a cost, and to "reshape" perceptions of nursing's economic and societal benefits.' Nursing has historically been a profession in which employees feel undervalued and underpaid (source), a fact which highlights the importance of celebrating the crucial, lifesaving work undertaken by our nurses every day.

#### Facts About Nursing:

- Nurses walk 4-5 miles every shift this fact was discovered by a study that fitted hospital nurses with pedometers.
- The symbol of nursing is an oil lamp the inspiration for the symbol was Florence Nightingale, arguably the most famous nurse in history. She was also known as The Lady with the Lamp as she would make her rounds to tend wounded soldiers during the Crimean war with an oil lamp.
- As of March 2023, there are 731,058 registered nurses in the UK.
- The biggest age demographic of UK registered nurses is 21-40.
- 11% of UK nurses identify as male, 89% identify as female.
- Nursing is the 'most trusted' profession according to the 2022 Gallup poll of honesty and ethical standards, nurses are trusted more than any other profession by the public.

#### A Nurse's Story: My Life in A&E During the Covid Crisis by Louise Curtis and Sarah Johnson



Newly qualified as an advanced clinical physician, thirty-two-year-old Louise Curtis was very much looking forward to going back to work in A&E in her Midlands hospital. What she did not expect was to be confronted with the most horrific frontline scenario a nurse could ever imagine. Moved into a newly created Intensive Care Unit for Covid patients, Louise was brought face to face with death and suffering on an unimaginable scale. A Nurse's Story is the nail-biting story of what she found there, how she tried to cope with it and the price she has had to pay for doing so. It is a heart-breaking and heart-warming account of what NHS staff are going through on a daily basis. It is a story of tears, bravery, self-sacrifice but also of hope and great kindness, of people pulling together and triumphing against daunting odds.

. . . Dodie Smith was an English novelist and playwright, best known for her novels I Capture the Castle (1948) and The Hundred and One Dalmatians (1956). Over her career, she wrote 9 novels, 11 plays, and 2 screenplays, as well as a 4volume autobiography. Smith was inspired to write plays at a young age by her grandfather - an avid theatregoer and Shakespeare enthusiast, her uncle Harold – an amateur actor, and her mother – an aspiring actor. Smith wrote her first play at the age of 10 and began acting in minor roles during her teens.


Though it seems that Dodie Smith's passion was for playwriting, her novels are what made her famous. The Hundred and One Dalmatians was adapted into an animated film in 1961, and a live action film in 1996, both produced by

Disney. The 1961 adaptation became the first animated feature to earn over \$10 million during its initial release, and when adjusted for inflation, is the second highest-grossing animated film globally. Smith loved dogs and at one point had 9 dalmatians as pets – her first Dalmatian was named Pongo, which later became the name she used for her novel's protagonist. I Capture the Castle was voted 'one of the nation's 100 best-loved novels' by the British public as part of the BBC's The Big Read in 2003 and was adapted for film in the same year.

Smith passed away in 1990 in Uttlesford, North Essex.

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### I Capture the Castle by Dodie Smith Through six turbulent months of 1934, 17-year-old Cassandra Mortmain keeps a journal, filling three notebooks with sharply funny yet poignant entries about her home, a ruined Suffolk castle, and her eccentric and penniless family. By the time the last diary shuts, there have been great changes in the Mortmain household, not the
